Meeting the cost of education



This information sheet provides suggestions on assistance available to help you meet the cost of your children's education. Parent Payments in Government Schools

The Education and Training Reform Act provides for free instruction in the standard curriculum program to all students in government schools. The Act also allows schools to charge fees to parents for goods & services provided by the school to a child.

Schools can request payment for:

- ⇒ Essential learning items such as text books, stationery, ID cards, locks etc. Parents may choose to provide their own items where practical and appropriate.
- ⇒ Optional items offered in addition to the standard curriculum, which you are not obligated to pay. These may include school magazines, class photos, music tuition, formals etc.

Schools may invite **voluntary financial contributions** for things such as a building or library fund but it is optional to pay it.

How can my child's school help?

If you are experiencing hardship, speak to the **School Wellbeing Officer**, **Principal or nominated parent payment contact person** about support options available. Your school can:

- ⇒ Waive, reduce or defer school fees
- ⇒ Extend deadlines or set up flexible payment plans
- ⇒ Give you the opportunity to provide cheaper alternatives or similar materials where possible & practical
- ⇒ Refer you to government/community assistance programs
- ⇒ Refer you to State Schools' Relief for uniforms & shoes
- ⇒ Organise a second hand text book sale at school
- ⇒ Provide a personal device at school if you cannot afford to buy or lease a device
- ⇒ Provide interpreting and translation services

Uniform and school shoes

State Schools' Relief (SSR) provides assistance with uniforms, shoes/runners, swimwear, underwear, scientific calculators, bags, text books, myki cards and glasses to students in need who are attending a Victorian government school. In 2020, Prep & Year 7 recipients of the Camps Sports & Excursion Fund (CSEF) automatically qualify for a uniform pack through SSR. Additional assistance is available through their welfare program. Speak to your school Principal or Wellbeing Officer to apply.

Equipment

Computers: If parents choose not to purchase or lease a device, the school must provide a device for your child during the times it is required at school. Information about the personal devices policy can be found at the <u>DET</u> website.

Camps, Sports & Excursions Fund

Financial assistance provided by the Victorian Government and paid to the school to assist eligible families to cover the costs of camps, sport and excursions in primary and secondary school. Preps and Year 7's need to register. Unused funds carry over to the next year, to a new school, to other siblings or to other families in need. Contact your school to make an application.

Travel Costs

Student Pass: Full time Victorian students attending an approved school can apply for a Student Pass through Public Transport Victoria. This may be cheaper than other Myki fares. Call 1800 800 007 or visit the PTV website. www.ptv.vic.gov.au

State Schools' Relief (SSR) is piloting a new Myki program to help support school attendance for students in primary and secondary schools who are living in financially difficult circumstances. Speak to your school Principal or Wellbeing Officer for more information.

Conveyance Allowance Program (CAP): Financial assistance to help families in rural and regional Victoria with the cost of transporting their children to their nearest government, nongovernment or specialist school. Contact your school for further information or visit the <u>DET</u> website.

Assistance for Isolated Children Scheme: Financial help for students who cannot attend a state school due to geographical isolation, special education needs, no reasonable access to school or changing circumstances. You may also be able to claim for the cost of home schooling your children. Call DHS on 132 318 or visit the Human Services website.

Child Care

Child Care Subsidy (CCS): A <u>subsidy</u> paid directly to child care providers to reduce the amount of child care fees you pay. Approved child care includes long day & occasional care, family day care, outside school hours care, vacation care & in home care. An eligible child must be 13 years or younger or 14-18 with a disability & meet immunisation requirements.

Additional Child Care Subsidy (ACCS): A top up payment in addition to CCS to help with the cost of approved child care. To qualify you must be transitioning to work from income support payments, be a grandparent in receipt of income support & a principal carer of your grandchildren, be experiencing temporary financial hardship, or require practical assistance to support your child's safety & wellbeing. Outside School Hours Care (OSHC): Provides care for primary school age children outside school hours and during school holidays. Talk to your school about what is available. School holiday care for secondary school students may be available in your area. Check with your local council.

School Breakfast Clubs: Offers a healthy <u>breakfast</u> for children in disadvantaged primary schools.

What can I do to reduce costs?

- ⇒ If you enter into a payment plan for school fees make sure you budget adequately for rent, food and bills
- ⇒ Plan school lunches, make your own snacks, buy in bulk
- ⇒ Cycle to school if there is a good, safe route
- ⇒ Swap books and uniforms with friends & neighbours
- \Rightarrow Reuse stationery– no need to buy them new each year
- ⇒ Label all school items
- ⇒ Shop around for sales items rather than expensive brands. Stationery shops may be cheaper than school ordering. Officeworks will price match and give a discount if their advertised price is the more expensive.
